 - What does the Railway clerk complain about his promotion?
 - Where did the railway clerk live?
 - What type of sonnet is Milton's "On His blindness"?

- What does Milton mean by the expression "era half my days"?
- Why, according to the poet, does man see 'little in nature'?
- "We lay waste our power"—Which 'waste' is described here by the poet?
- How does Brutus justify the killing of Caesar to the people of Rome?
- "Let him be Caesar." – Who is the speaker and who is referred to as "him"?
- How does Antony address the citizens in the beginnings of his speech?
- Where was the young woman in "A Cup of Tea" standing when approached by the strange man?
- What is the name of the store owner?
- What kind of flower does Rosemary like and dislike?

2. Answer any **five** of the following questions: $2 \times 5 = 10$
- "Shall they return to beatings of great bells In wild train-loads?" – Who are they? How does the poet describe their return?

- b) Who says “I wish I was a bird” and where? What does the speaker mean here?
- c) What does the railway clerk say about his office desk?
- d) How does the railway clerk spend his time with his friends?
- e) What is meant by “a sordid boon” in the poem “The World is Too Much with Us”?
- f) Why does Rosemary wish to take the poor girl home?
- g) When and where did Rosemary meet the girl? What was her name?
- h) What is the crowd’s reaction to Brutus’s speech?

3. Answer any **two** of the following questions:

- a) Write a short note on Rosemary’s character in Katherine Mansfield’s “A Cup of Tea”.
- b) How, according to William Wordsworth, is the world “too much with us”. Discuss.
- c) “God doth not need

Explain with close reference to the context.
